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
Return of the Arch



In 2005, at their 45th Reunion, the Class of 1960 envisioned a space on campus dedicated to their parents and future generations of students. Ten years later, they returned to campus for their 55th Reunion to dedicate the Gateway Heritage Plaza, situated between the University Academic Building and Knott Science Center. With the help of their Little Sister Class of 1962, they raised all funds necessary to see their vision become a reality.

Crowned by the historical arch that for years welcomed people at the original Charles Street entrance to campus, the Plaza is a metaphorical testament to the interconnectedness between Notre Dame, the students it has helped to mold, and the countless others it has yet to inspire and empower.

One Maryland One Book Author Tour Comes to NDMU



In late September, Notre Dame was one of the sites selected to host an author lecture as part of the Maryland Humanities Council's One Maryland One Book program. This year's book, authored by Daniel James Brown, is The Boys in the Boat: Nine Americans and Their Epic Quest for Gold at the 1936 Olympics. Baltimore City and Prince George's County high school students and members of the NDMU community were treated to the author's recounting of how this critically acclaimed book came into being and the challenges faced by the American rowing team that led our nation to victory at Hitler's Olympics. One Maryland One Book aims to unite a diverse audience across the state through the shared experience of reading the same book. "We might read alone," said President Marylou Yam in her welcoming remarks, "but discussion helps us experience a book together."



NDMU: Among the Best!

Notre Dame ranks among the most successful schools in balancing the cost of attendance, likelihood of degree completion, and earning potential of its graduates, according to the College Reality Check database developed by *The Chronicle of Higher Education.* The University has also been been included in a list of the Best Catholic Colleges and Universities by College Choice, which ranked NDMU at #31 in the country. It also placed Notre Dame at #11 among Best U.S. Women's Colleges and #24 among Northern Regional Universities.

Blazing Success for First-Generation Students



The School Sisters of Notre Dame Midwest-Atlantic Province have provided a generous \$100,000 grant for the Trailblazers Program an academic support and career readiness program for first-generation students at NDMU.

Over 25 percent of the Women's College's students—more than 150 young women— voluntarily participate in the program. Active Trailblazers consistently perform at higher academic levels and have significantly higher retention rates than their first-generation peers and, in some cases, than all students. By spring 2016, about 60 students are expected to have completed the four-year program and have earned their bachelor's degrees. A third of them have graduated *cum laude* or *magna cum laude*. Cindy Contreras, one of four daughters of a single mother who is a refugee from El Salvador, is a proud graduate of the Trailblazers Program. She was the first of her family to attend college and relied on Trailblazers for support in navigating a challenging academic program and a complex financial aid system. She is currently pursuing a master's degree in education at Notre Dame and is student teaching at a local elementary school. "I love what I'm doing, and I love Trailblazers for helping me get here!" she says.

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Service, Scholarships, and Scrubs

New program to provide support for Caroline Center women



The Caroline Center in East Baltimore, an SSND-sponsored organization that educates women for careers with potential for advancement, will benefit from a new partnership with NDMU that will provide their clients with financial and academic support to help them enter meaningful careers and reach their full potential. The program also features service opportunities for Notre Dame students, faculty, and staff.

"Service, Scholarships, and Scrubs" will provide a scholarship to regularly support a Caroline Center client who wants to improve her career prospects by earning a bachelor's degree at NDMU. Notre Dame will provide mentoring, campus visits, and "lunch and learns," which will help Caroline Center clients learn about our nursing and pharmacy programs and the future careers they might consider. Through the Scrub Fund, NDMU community members and others purchased scrub tops—often an added expense for women with limited financial means—for clients who need them to participate in the Center's healthcare training programs.




4 Under 40 Literary Event

Ambassador Miculescu, the first woman in Romania to reach the rank of ambassador, has made the cause of gender equality her life's work. She urged her Knott Auditorium audience to get involved in the global campaign for gender equality because "empowering women is not only the right thing to do, it is the smart thing to do."

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More than **30 Japanese high school students in an English language/science program** enrolled in our English Language Institute this summer, and toured area science museums and facilities during their stay.

Common Reading for 2015: Five Days at Memorial



This fall marks the 10th anniversary of Hurricane Katrina. In the Notre Dame spirit of calling forth social justice questions, and in recognition of this anniversary, the Common Reading Committee selected *Five Days at Memorial* by Sheri Fink as the 2015 Common Reading.

The book recounts the struggle of caregivers at New Orleans Memorial Medical Center in serving their patients during the hurricane, and the subsequent questions of legal and moral responsibility raised by this crisis. Ms. Fink is a recipient of numerous honors, including the National Magazine Award, the Overseas Press Club Lowell Thomas Award, and the 2010 Pulitzer Prize for Investigative Reporting. She earned a doctorate in neuroscience and a medical degree from Stanford University. She is a staff writer for *The New York Times*.
