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EXPLORE BALTIMORE

Known as "Charm City," the City of Baltimore is a place where history, culture, and innovation blend seamlessly, offering a unique and enriching experience.

Baltimore boasts a rich and diverse history, playing a pivotal role in the American Revolution, the War of 1812, and the Civil Rights Movement. You will find this history preserved in the city's numerous museums, historic sites, and neighborhoods. The Inner Harbor, a bustling waterfront area, is home to attractions like the National Aquarium, the Maryland Science Center, and historic ships that tell the story of Baltimore's maritime heritage. Baltimore is also the home of the Baltimore Ravens, a franchise of the National Football League (NFL), and the Baltimore Orioles, a franchise of Major League Baseball (MLB).

We are just:

- > 14 miles or 22 km from Baltimore/Washington International Airport (BWI)
- > 15 minutes from Downtown Baltimore
- > 45 minutes from Washington, D.C.
- > 2 hours from Philadelphia
- > 3 hours from Maryland beaches
- > 3 hours from New York City







IMMIGRATION & ARRIVAL

As a new member of the NDMU family, you will join a tight-knit global community with international students, staff, and faculty from all continents.

PREPARE

- > Apply for your Form I-20
- > Apply for your US Visa at your local Embassy
- > Keep all required documents and receipts. These will be needed upon arrival

ARRIVAL

- You will be assigned an I-94 number upon arrival which is proof of your legal visitor status. (https://i94.cbp.dhs.gov/I94/#/recent-search)
- You must register with your DSO once you arrive on campus. Contact Dr. Jens Mueller (jmueller@ndm.edu) to schedule a meeting.





INSURANCE & IMMUNIZATION

Before arriving at NDMU, you need to have health insurance and the required immunizations. While you can receive missing immunizations on campus, it is better – and less stressful – to get as much out of the way in your home country!

INSURANCE

- All eligible students will automatically be enrolled in the University-Sponsored Health Insurance Plan
- If you have outside health coverage, you have the option to opt out of the University Sponsored Plan

IMMUNIZATION

- > Understand the immunization requirements.
- Get an immunization form filled out by a medical professional. Scan this document – you will need it later!
- Submit the required information to NDMU

GET A U.S. BANK ACCOUNT

Setting up a bank account is simple. You will need your **passport**, **proof of residence**, **Student ID**, **and**, **for some banks**, **your Social**

Security Number (SSN). Visit the different banks around campus, inquire explicitly about their student plans/benefits, and choose the one that works best for your needs. Note that some banks in your home country may have partnerships with banks in the United States, too, which could reduce charges and fees for transactions and deposits.

HOUSING & DINING

HOUSING

Both undergraduate and graduate students have on-campus housing to choose from. Undergraduate students who have less than 60 credits are required to live on campus. STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

Working part-time on campus is a great way to cover some of your living expenses. Below are some things to keep in mind:

- > International students are limited to on-campus employment.
- International students are not allowed to work for more than 20 hours per week, except during breaks, when they may work full time (40 hours per week)
- > You can search for jobs on the Student Career Page in Gator Hub (Look under the "Student" tab for "Student Employment Application").
- Then you must apply for a Social Security Number (SSN) to work in the U.S., get paid, and file taxes.

If you become a Resident Advisor (RA), your accommodation expenses will be reduced!

Note: You must consult with your DSO about any employment opportunities.







CURRICULAR PRACTICAL TRAINING (CPT) & OPTIONAL PRACTICAL TRAINING (OPT)

СРТ

Students can take part in various kinds of off-campus work such as an internship, practicum or cooperative education programs. The training must be an integral part of the established curriculum for the student's program as stated in the degree requirements listed in the University catalog.

Most students will not be eligible for this training until they have maintained full-time status for at least one academic year. Please note:

- > If the practical training is not for academic credits, it must be a required part of the curriculum for all students.
- Practical training for academic credits may be required or optional. That is to say, if the student's major does not require practical training but a particular course or curricular track within the program does require it, permission may be authorized.
- Internships offered under cooperative agreements between an employer and the University may be authorized.

OPT

Students are eligible for up to 12 months of off-campus employment for the purpose of obtaining additional training and experience directly related to a student's major area of study.

- Eligibility begins after the student has maintained full-time status for at least one academic year.
- > There are two types of optional practical training:
 - Pre-completion OPT: Part-time employment limited to 20 hours per week during the normal academic semester while the student maintains a full-time course load or full or part-time employment during the summer term. Any authorization granted during pre-completion will be deducted from the total 12 months of eligibility.
 - Post-Completion OPT: Work authorization granted after completion of all course studies for full-time employment. Post-completion practical training is granted for a period of up to 12 months

minus any period of time authorized during pre-completion practical training.

Note: You must consult with your DSO about any employment opportunities.
