ACADEMIC PROGRAM ARTICULATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN
COMMUNITY COLLEGE OF BALTIMORE COUNTY AND
NOTRE DAME OF MARYLAND UNIVERSITY REGARDING TRANSFER FROM
THE ASSOCIATE OF FINE ARTS IN FINE ART FINE AND PERFORMING ARTS
AREA OF CONCENTRATION (AOC) AND VISUAL DESIGN TO NOTRE DAME OF
MARYLAND'S BACHELOR OF ART IN ART

This Academic Program Articulation Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into by and between Community College of Baltimore County (the "Sending Institution") and Notre Dame of Maryland (the "Receiving Institution") (collectively, the "Institutions") to facilitate the transfer of academic credits from Associate of Fine Arts in Fine Art and Visual Design Fine and Performing Arts Area of Concentration (AOC) for the completion of Bachelor of Art in Art at Notre Dame of Maryland University (the "Program(s)").

A. Qualifying Students

This Agreement pertains to the transfer of "Qualifying Students", i.e., those students who:

- 1. Have successfully completed the program at the Sending Institution;
- 2. Are enrolled in the Sending Institution, in good standing; and
- 3. Are accepted for admission to the Receiving Institution

B. Responsibilities of the Institutions

The Institutions agree to implement the transfer of Qualifying Students in accordance with applicable law and the following requirements and protocols:

- 1. A Qualifying Student may transfer into from the Transferring Institution into the Receiving Institution for the completion of the Program.
- 2. Courses that the Receiving School will accept credits for towards completion of the Program include:

This transfer plan is intended for students pursuing an A.F.A. in Fine Art and Visual Design Fine and Performing Arts (AOC) at Community College of Baltimore County who are interested in pursuing a B.A. at Notre Dame of Maryland University. The equivalencies below demonstrate how a student can meet both the requirements of the associate degree and prepare for a seamless transfer to Notre Dame of Maryland. Please note:

3. Additional Provisions

Degree-seeking transfer students who have completed a Maryland Community College Transfer Associate Degree may use the University Catalog in effect at the time of their first entry into an approved Maryland Community College. The transfer to NDMU must be made within three years of their first entry into the community college and provided enrollment has not been interrupted for two or more consecutive regular semesters not including summer sessions.

A transfer student or a student who enters with advanced standing from another university and becomes a candidate for a bachelor's degree at NDMU must fulfill a minimum residence requirement of two semesters (or four summer sessions) at NDMU and must earn at least 25 percent of the credit hours required for the degree through instruction offered by the University. A minimum of 50% of the courses included in the Major requirements in a NDMU Program of Study must be taken at Notre Dame University Maryland. In addition, the last 30 credit hours of a degree program must be completed in residence at Notre Dame.

No credit earned at a community or junior college may be used for credit at the 300* or 400 course level. Additional restrictions may apply. Students should discuss their Residency Requirements with their Advisor or college Dean's Office (*unless course is specifically designed as part of an Official Articulation or Memorandum of Understanding between institutions).

- Courses that fulfill program requirements are only eligible for transfer if students
 have earned a grade of "C-" or better. Courses used to fulfill only general education
 requirements are eligible for transfer if students have earned a grade of "C-" or better.
- Students must maintain a (2.5) cumulative grade point average (GPA) in order to transfer
- Students intending to transfer should complete the admission application at the fouryear institution following the third semester of their Associate Degree program.
- 4. The Receiving Institution shall designate, and shall provide to the Sending Institution, the contact information for a staff person at the Receiving Institution who is responsible for the oversight of the transfer of Qualifying Students. 5. If the Qualifying Student is using federal Title 38 VA Education Benefits (GI Bill® Education Benefits), the Institutions shall adhere to all applicable U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs' regulations, including the regulations governing the awarding prior credit, as regulated under Title 38, Code of Federal Regulations, Sections 21.4253(d)(3) and 21.4254(c)(4).

- 6. Each Institution shall adhere to all applicable transfer requirements set forth in the Annotated Code of Maryland and the Code of Maryland Regulations.
- 7. Each Institution shall advise students regarding transfer opportunities under this Agreement, and shall advise students of financial aid opportunities and implications associated with the transfer.
- 8. Should either Institution make changes to program requirements, the institution will inform the partner institution immediately. The articulation agreement should be updated to reflect the changes and forwarded to the Maryland Higher Education Commission.

C. Term and Termination

- 1. This agreement shall be effective on the date that it is signed by the appropriate and authorized representatives of each Institution.
- 2. Either Institution may, at its sole discretion, terminate this Agreement upon delivering 90 days written notice to the other Institution and the Maryland Higher Education Commission.
- Both Institutions agree to meet once every 3 year(s) to review the terms of this agreement, and renew or apply edits in written correspondence, copied to each party referenced in this document.

D. Amendment

- This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding and agreement of the Institutions with respect to their rights and obligations in carrying out the terms of the Agreement, and supersedes any prior or contemporaneous agreements or understandings.
- 2. This Agreement may be modified only by written amendment executed by both Institutions.

E. Governing Law

This Agreement shall be governed by, and construed in accordance with, the laws of the State of Maryland.

F. Counterparts

This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original, but all of which, taken together, shall constitute one and the same agreement.

G. Notice of Agreement

- 1. The Institutions agree to provide a copy of this Agreement, with any amendments, to the Maryland Higher Education Commission.
- 2. The Institutions agree to provide copies of this Agreement to all relevant individuals and departments of the Institutions, including but not limited to students, academic department chairs participating in the transfer, offices of the president, registrar's offices, and financial aid offices.
- 3. Subject to any limitations and defenses imposed or available by law, the Institutions agree that each shall be responsible for its own actions and omissions, pursuant to the performance of this MOU or arising out of the arrangement described in this MOU, and neither party shall try to hold the other liable with respect to any matter not arising from the other party's actions or omissions.
- 4. Each party will indemnify, defend and hold the other, its agents employees and students harmless from and against all claims, damages, liabilities, law suits, and expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees and costs threatened or incurred, arising out of any personal injury or property damage caused solely by the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of an agent, employee or student of the indemnifying party in the course of the program described in this MOU.

H. No Third-Party Beneficiaries

There are no third-party beneficiaries to this Agreement.

I. Representations and Warranties of the Parties

Both Institutions represent and warrant that the following shall be true and correct as of the Effective Date of this Agreement, and shall continue to be true and correct during the term of this Agreement:

- The Institutions are and shall remain in compliance with all applicable federal, state, and local statutes, laws, ordinances, and regulations relating to this Agreement, as amended from time to time.
- 2. Each Institution has taken all action necessary for the approval and execution of this Agreement.
